**Deputy Sheriff
Ford Tyson "Toby" Humphrey**

**Killed in the Line of Duty
October 9, 1980**

In memory of our fallen brother, **DEPUTY SHERIFF FORD TYSON "TOBY" HUMPHREY**, who lost his life in the pursuit of serving and protecting the citizens of Stafford County. On October 9, 1980, 26-year-old Ford Tyson "Toby" Humphrey was killed in the line of duty by a gunman while attempting to quell a domestic disturbance. Deputy Humphrey served his community as a Deputy Sheriff as well as a volunteer member of the Fredericksburg Rescue Squad.

**Killed in the Line of Duty
October 19, 2007**

In memory of our fallen brother, **DEPUTY SHERIFF JASON EDWARD MOONEY**, who lost his life on October 19, 2007, in service to the citizens of Stafford County. Jason Edward Mooney, age 24, was killed in the line of duty while responding to a traffic accident on I-95. Deputy Mooney epitomized public service. He served in the United States Marine Corp in Al-Asad, Iraq, had been a boy scout and was also a volunteer fireman with Stafford Company 2 at the time of his death.

The death of Deputy Toby Humphrey and the death of Deputy Jason Mooney serve to remind us of the inherent dangers of police work, and that any given shift may end abruptly in serious injury or death. May we focus not on the death of these two public servants, but their service that was best characterized by loyalty, fearless performance of duty, and faithful and honorable devotion to the principles of the Stafford Sheriff's Office.

The Stafford Sheriff's Office is dedicated to providing the best law enforcement services possible. It is a challenging mission but one that we consistently strive to accomplish. Every citizen deserves to live in a safe community. For this reason, we want to ensure that Stafford County continues to be one of the safest.

STAFFORD PUBLIC SAFETY

Ford T. Humphrey Building



On Friday, February 1, 2008, Stafford County opened the brand new Public Safety Center. The Public Safety Center houses the Stafford County Sheriff's Office, the Fire and Rescue Department, and the Emergency Communications Center. This state of the art facility was constructed under Virginia's Public Private Education Facilities Infrastructure Act of 2002, or PPEA. The PPEA grants responsible public entities the authority to create private-public partnerships for the development of a wide range of projects for public use if the public entities determine that there is a need for the project and private involvement may provide the project in a timely or cost effective fashion.

The building is named after Deputy Sheriff Ford Tyson "Toby" Humphrey who was killed in the line of duty on October 9, 1980. The Ford T. Humphrey Building is 112,000 sq.ft. and has been built with enough room to allow for the expansion that the Stafford County Sheriff's Office and the Fire and Rescue Department will experience in the future.



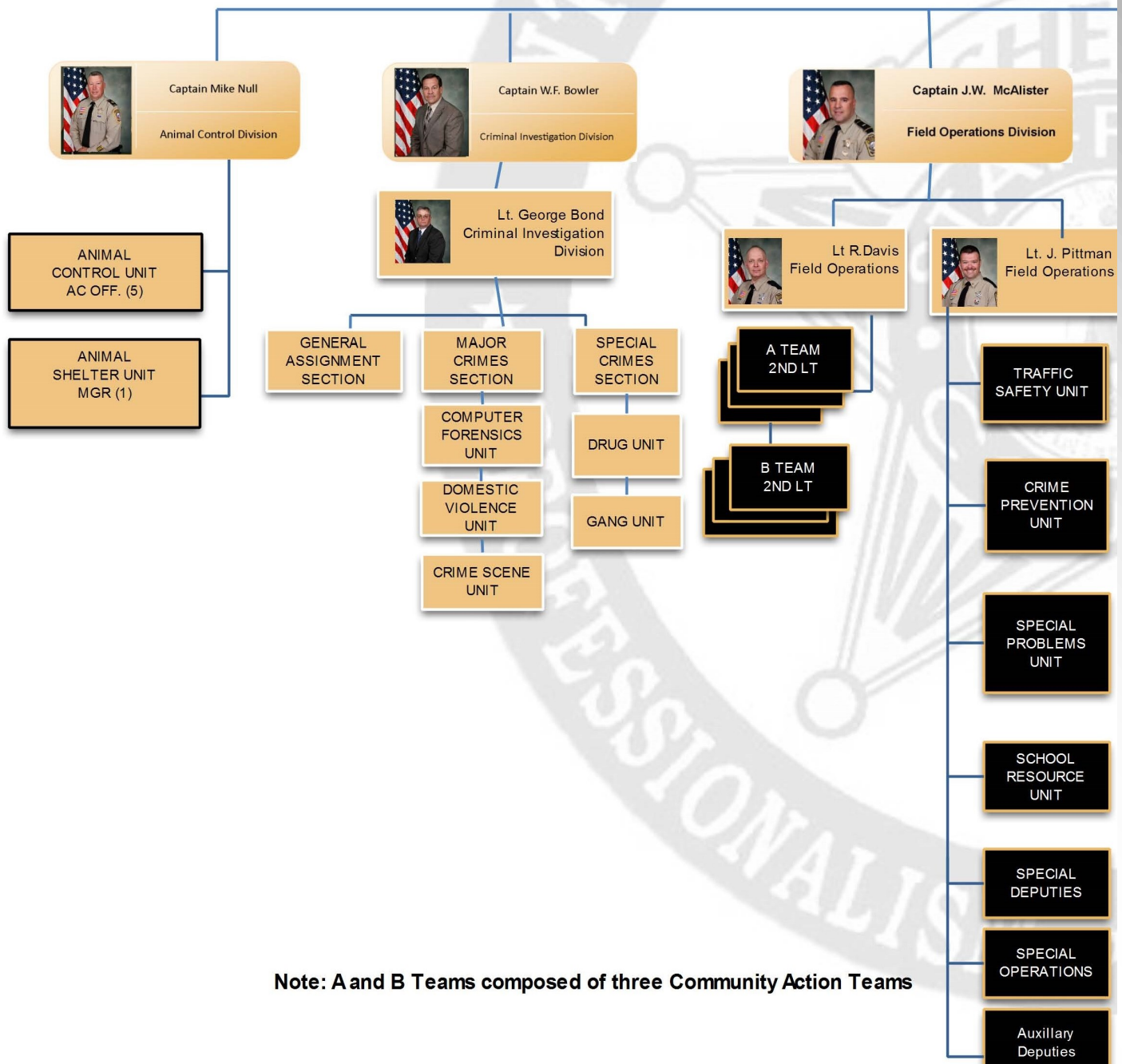

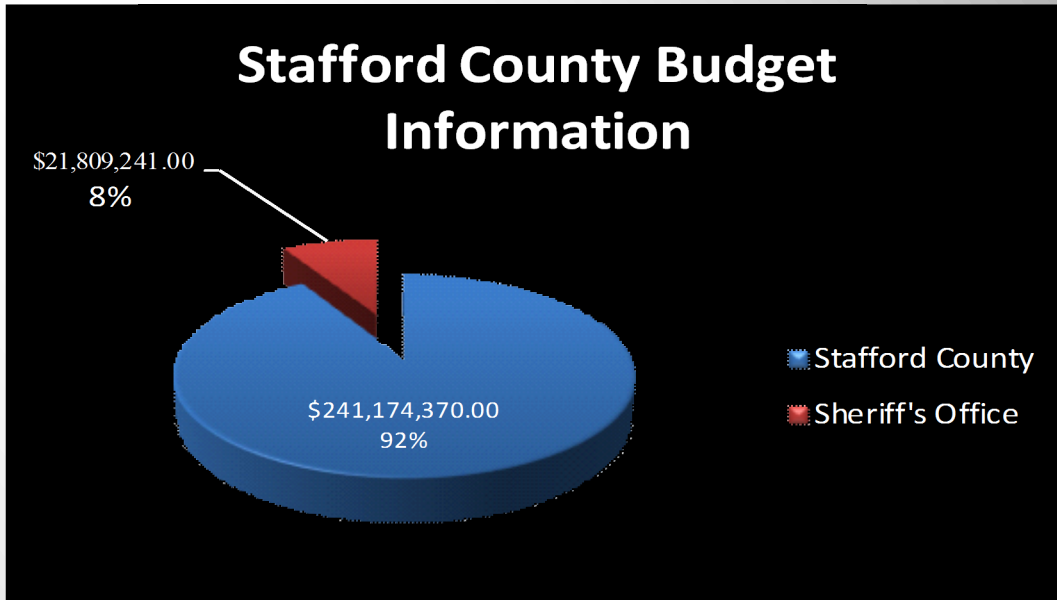


STAFFORD COUNTY 10 YEAR POPULATION GROWTH

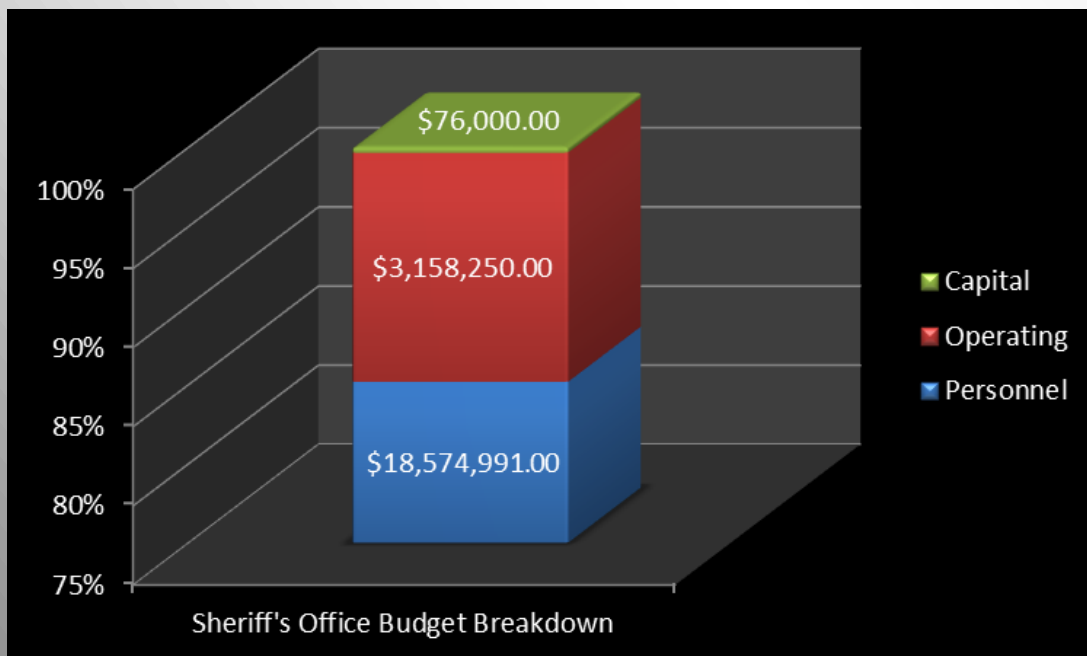

SHERIFF'S OFFICE BUDGET INFORMATION

The Stafford County Sheriff's Office budget is but one component of the overall Stafford County budget. For the FY 2012 the total county budget was \$241,174,370.00. Of that budget the Sheriff's Office budget was \$21,809,241.00 or 8% of the overall County budget.



The Sheriff's Office budget is broken into three main categories: Personnel, Operating Costs and Capital. Personnel deals with the salaries and benefits of the 244 Sheriff's Office employees. Operating Costs deal with the day-to-day operations of the Sheriff's Office to include training, technology, vehicles and fuel. Capital costs include a vehicle for the Animal Control Division and various lease agreements.



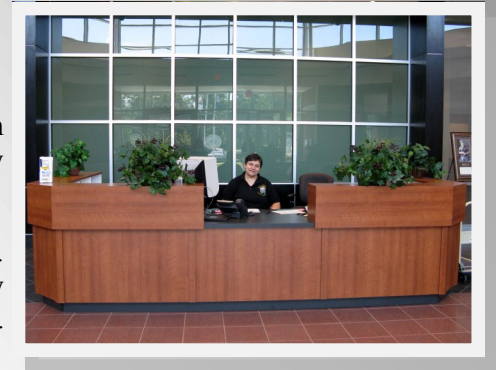
PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

The Sheriff is elected by the citizens of Stafford County and has an obligation to efficiently and effectively enforce the laws of the Commonwealth. He directs all Sheriff's Office duties and has final authority in matters of policy, operations and discipline.

RECEPTION DESK

All general inquiries go through the Reception Desk located in the main lobby of the Stafford County Public Safety Center, Ford T. Humphrey Building.

The Reception Desk is open to the public from 8:00 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday for normal business purposes. A deputy is on duty at the Reception Desk from 4:30 p.m. – 9:00 p.m. for walk-in emergencies. The Humphrey Building is in operation 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.



If you visit the Stafford County Public Safety Center, Ford T. Humphrey Building after the above-mentioned hours, there is a phone in the vestibule that will automatically connect you to the Emergency Communications Center.

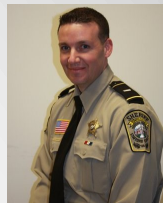

SHERIFF'S OFFICE HONORS LAW ENFORCEMENT PERSONNEL FOR SERVICE

The Stafford County Sheriff's Office held its annual awards ceremony on Thursday, May 3, 2012 to honor law enforcement personnel who have provided exemplary service to the community.

"Law enforcement officers put their lives on the line every day to serve and protect the citizens of Stafford," said Sheriff Jett. "The awards ceremony is an opportunity to formally acknowledge their extraordinary efforts and show our appreciation for their hard work and dedication."

Sheriff Charles Jett presented 53 honorees with awards for their actions and performance. A Meritorious Award was given for emergencies in which a Sheriff's Office member demonstrated judgment, ingenuity or performance that clearly exceeds what is required and expected. A Commendation Award was given in the instances in which a Sheriff's Office member demonstrated exemplary service. A Traffic Safety Award was given to two deputies for traffic safety prevention, education and enforcement. A Community Award was given for initiating and then working to pass the Blue Alert Law. A Unit Citation Award was given for overall excellence during a specific event or incident.

Individuals were selected by an Awards Committee consisting of personnel from the Operations, Criminal Investigations and Civil//Court Divisions and the Public Information Office. Individuals were nominated by other deputies or personnel of the Sheriff's Office. The committee evaluated the nominations based on the following criteria: bravery and heroism; exemplary performance which directly resulted in the solution of a major crime or crimes, or apprehension of a particularly dangerous criminal; and exceptional performance. The committee forwarded all nominations that they recommend to the Sheriff for his review and action.

The following personnel received awards:

AWARD RECIPIENTS

Virginia State Senator Richard H. Stuart received the **Legislative Community Award** and **Ms. Irene Egan** received the **Citizen Community Award** for their combined efforts initiating and then having passed in the Virginia Legislature the Blue Alert Law. This law works the same as an Amber Alert when searching for a law enforcement officer that is found missing in the line of duty or for a suspect who has just caused the death or serious injury of a law enforcement officer.

Senior Detective Michelle M. Gibbons, Master Detective Christopher P. Cameron, Senior Detective Sean M. Danyluk, Master Detective Timothy A. Covington, Detective First Class Eric D. Chinault, Detective Barry Surles, Senior Deputy Benjamin P. Woodson and Deputy First Class Kurt W. McBride were recipients of a Letter of Commendation for their combined efforts in solving a brutal homicide. The 17-year-old suspect eventually pleaded guilty to murdering her own mother.

Sergeant Chadwick S. Oxley and Master Detective Christopher P. Cameron received a **Letter of Commendation** for their combined efforts in helping retrieve a missing grandchild that had been brought to Stafford by a non-custodial parent.

Senior Deputy Angelo M. Irizarry received a **Letter of Commendation** for his efforts in handling an incident that involved a high school student assaulting Deputy Irizarry.

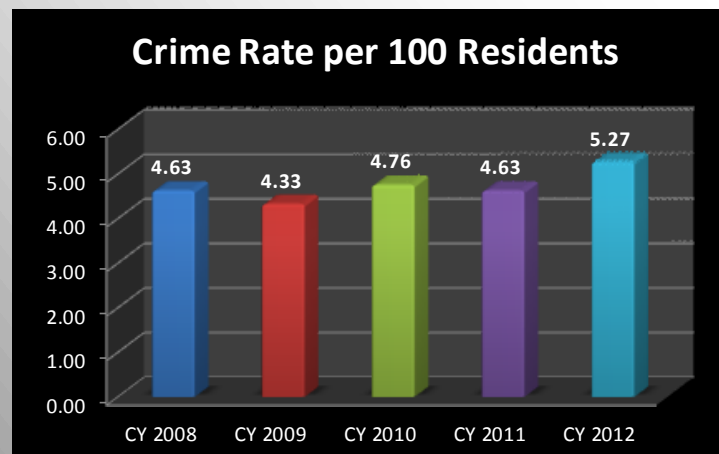

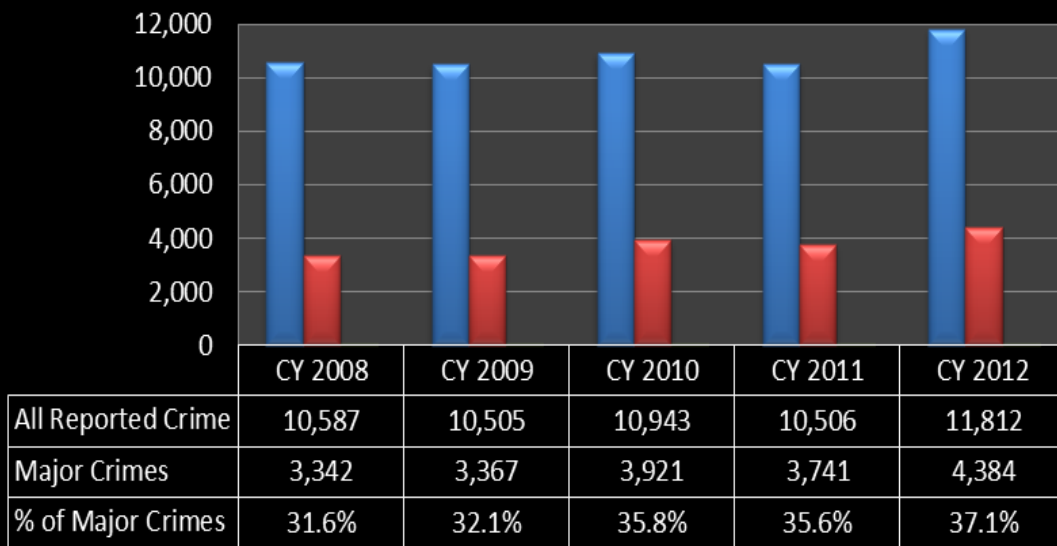
The overall Group A crime in Stafford County was 5.27 crimes per one hundred residents in 2012.



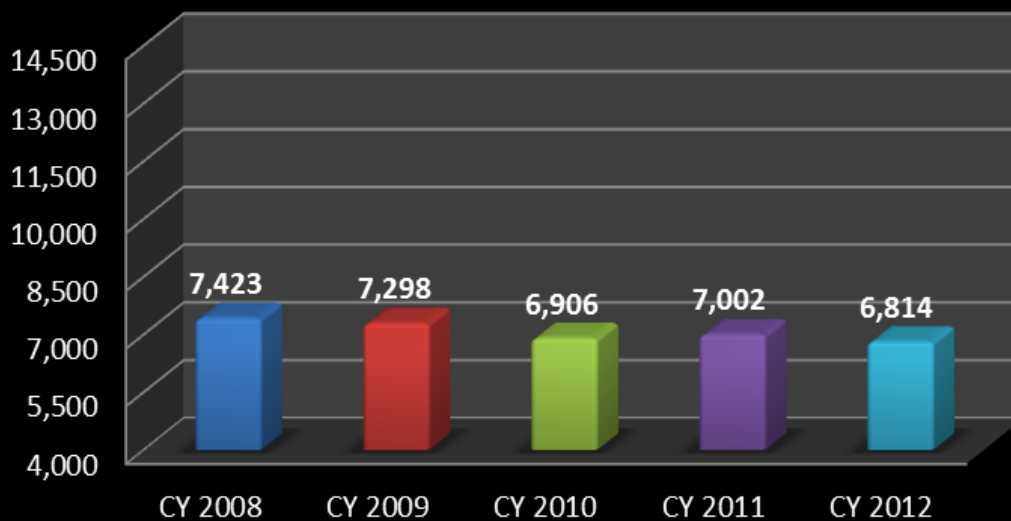
CRIME FACTORS AND STATISTICS

Major Crime Comparison of All Crimes Reported

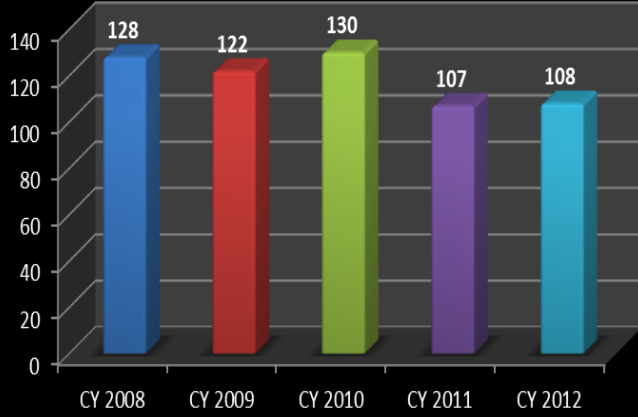

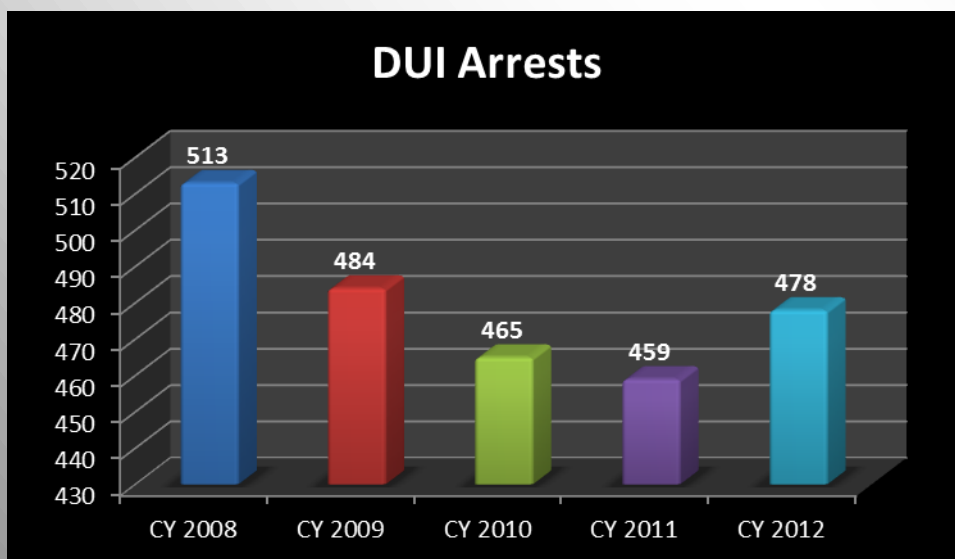
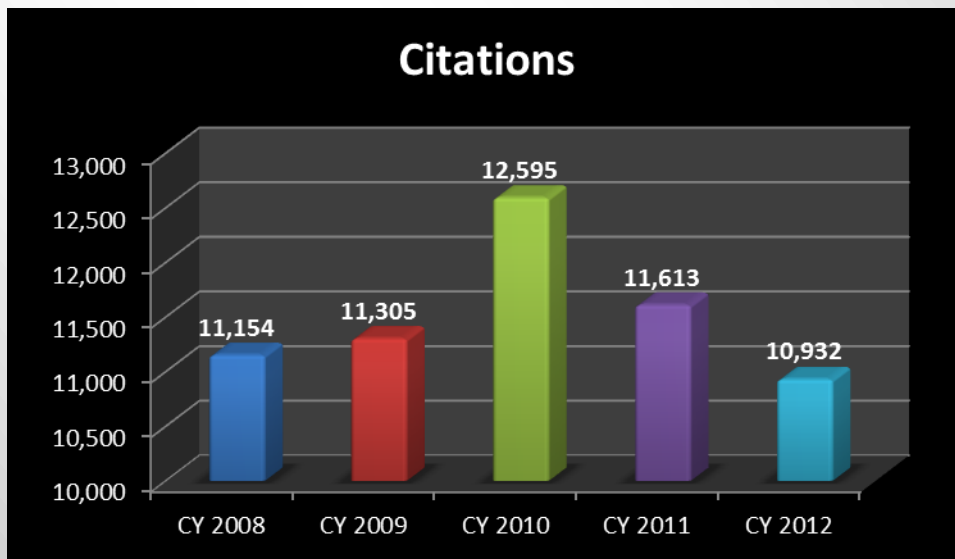
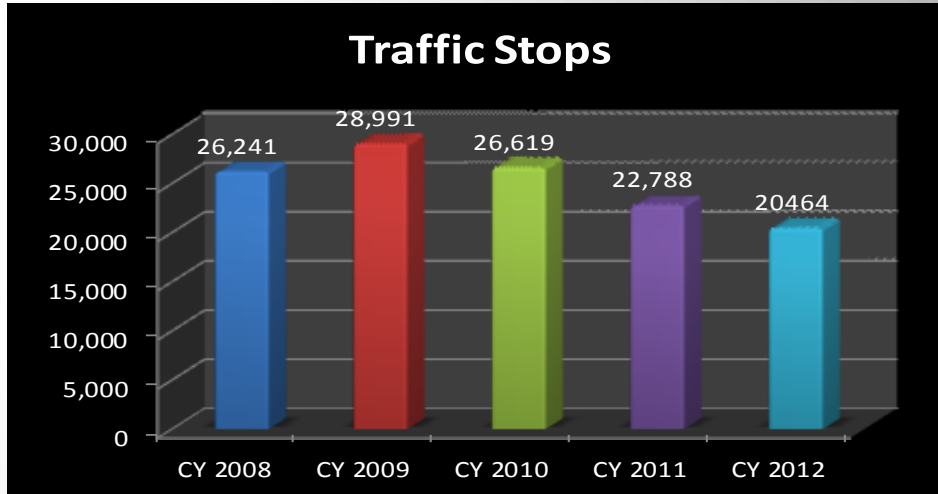


Each year, deputies put their lives on the line to protect our community. The graph below shows the number of assaults on deputies over the past 5 years.

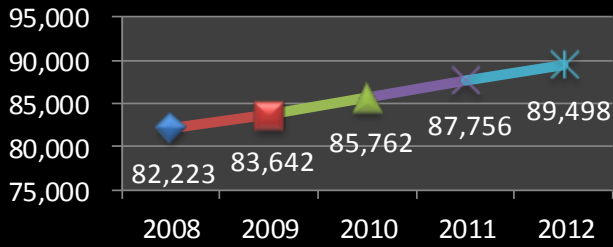

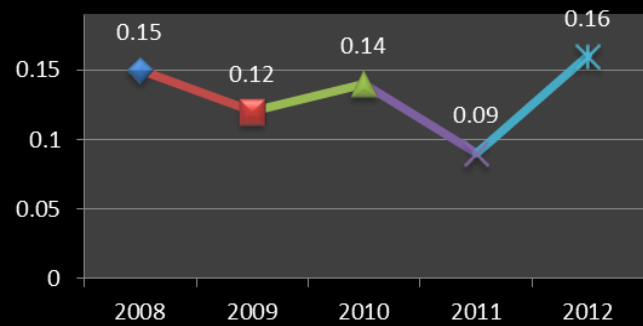

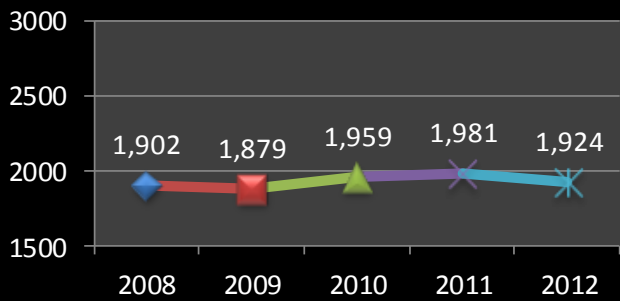
Licensed Drivers in Stafford County



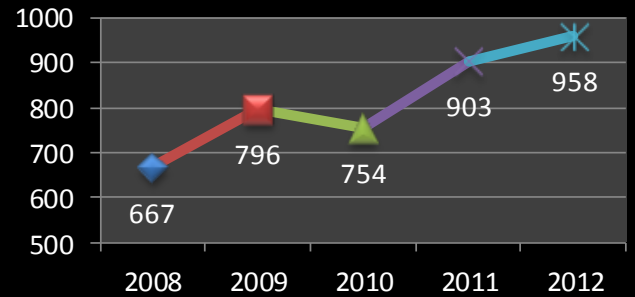
Death Rate per 1,000 Drivers



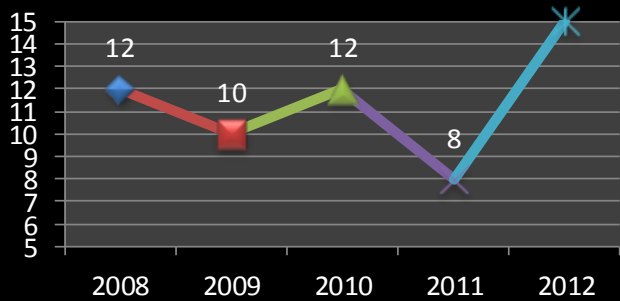

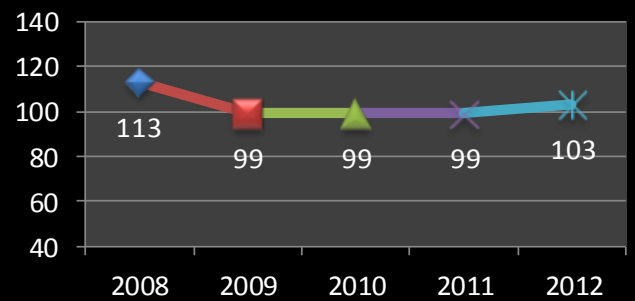
Accident Injuries



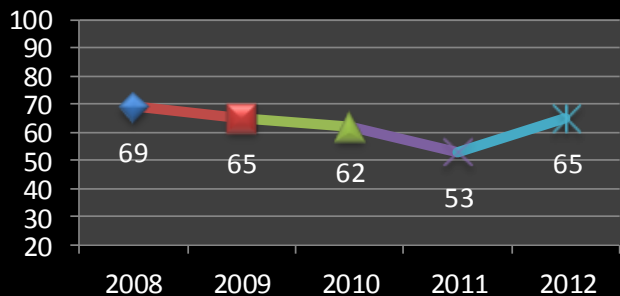
Accident Fatalities



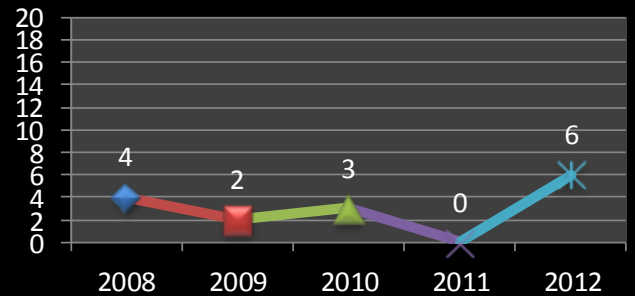
Alcohol-Related Crashes



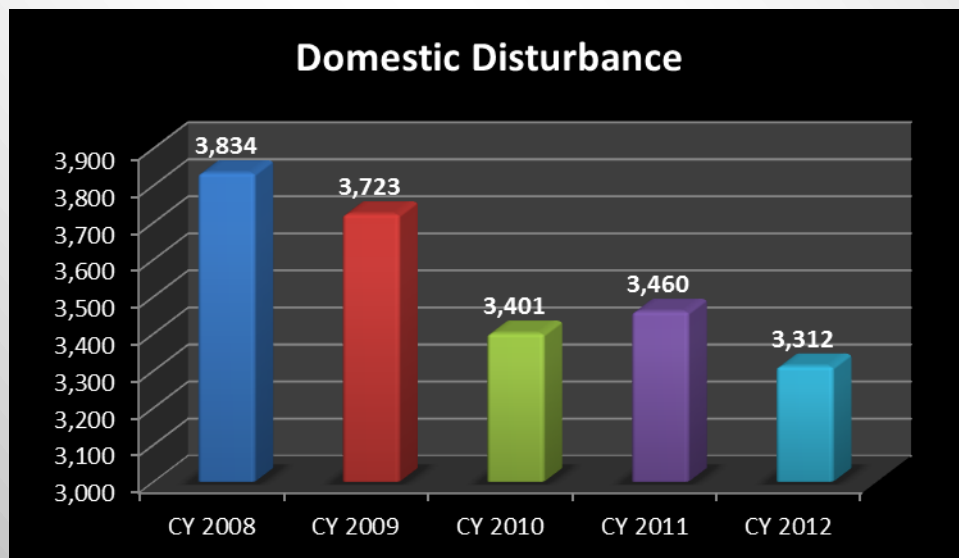
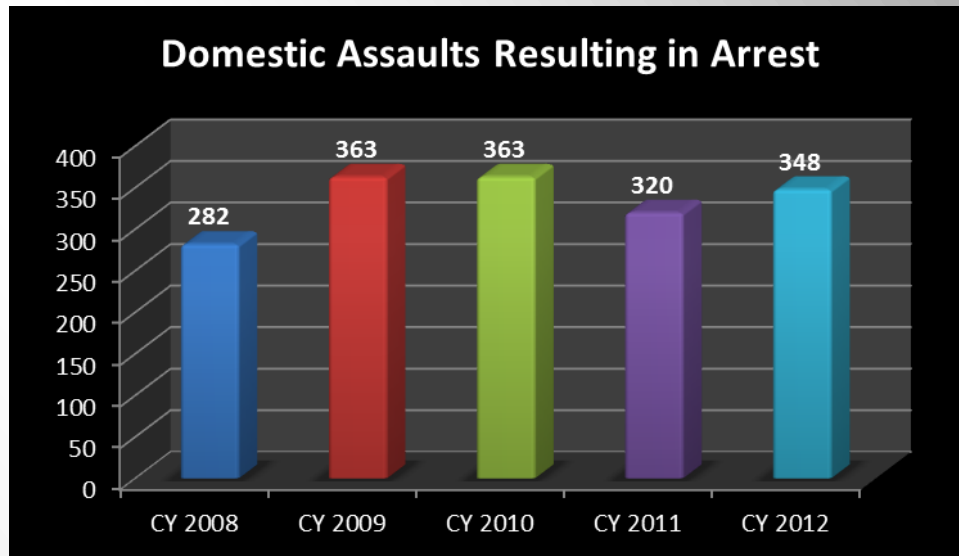
Alcohol-Related Injuries

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE STATISTICS



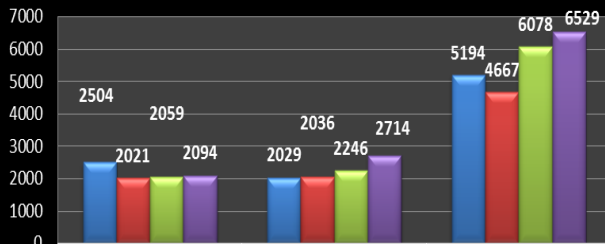
Reports of domestic disturbances decreased and domestic assaults increased during 2012. Domestic disturbance calls accounted for 4.42% of all requested law enforcement service.

Domestic Disturbance is defined as any conflict (verbal or physical) between household members that require law enforcement advice, guidance or intervention.

Domestic Assault is defined by law as the assault and battery against a family or household member and is punishable as a Class 1 misdemeanor ([up to 12 months in jail and/or up to a \\$2,500 fine, either or both](#)).

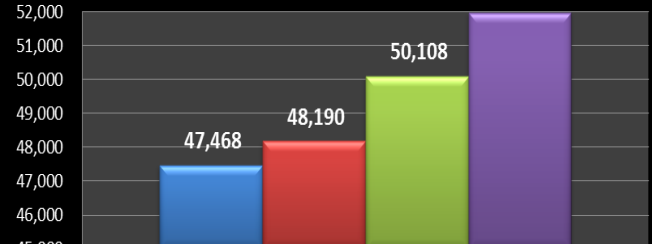

ECC Call Volumes



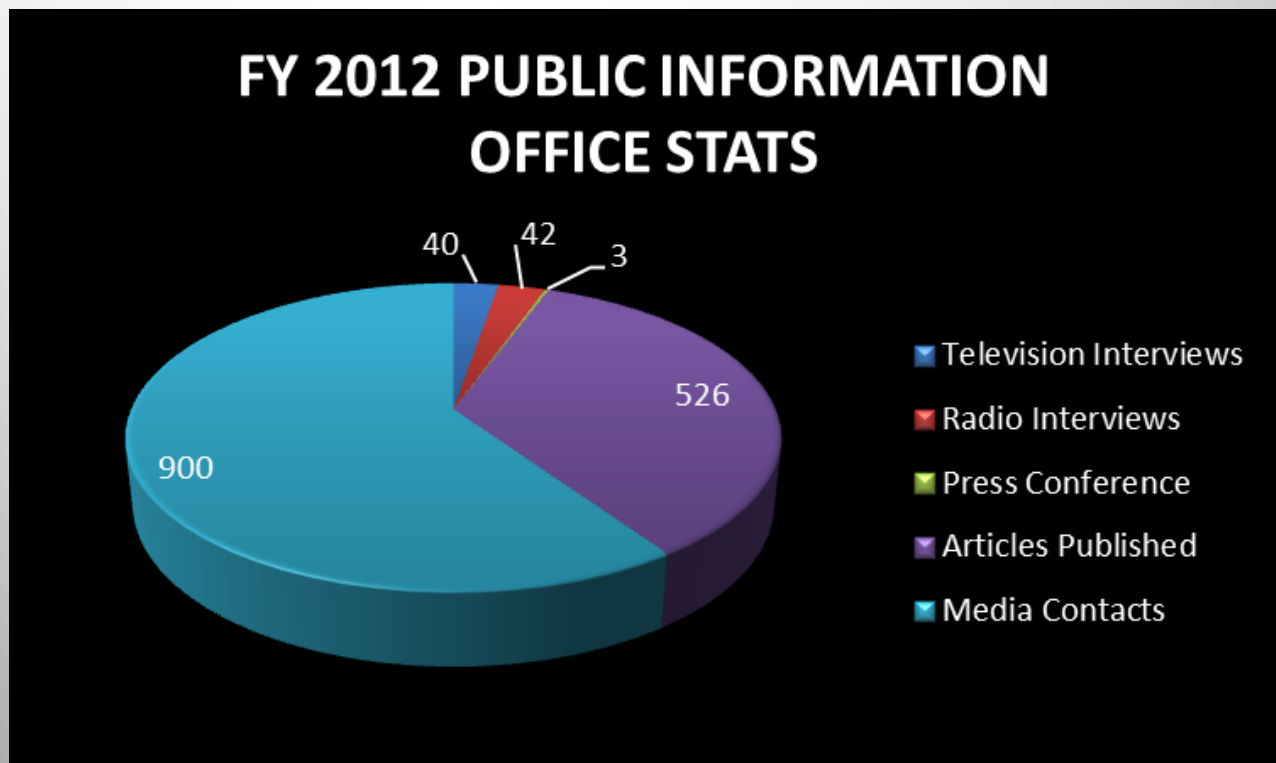

PUBLIC INFORMATION OFFICE

In 2011 & 2012 Community Service Media of Florida produced two Public Service Announcements with Sheriff Charles Jett. The two 30 second PSA's dealt with texting and driving and teen drinking and driving. The PSA's have been shown in all Stafford County High Schools, Stafford County Cable stations, as well as national cable stations seen in Stafford County to include BET, FX, MTV, Hallmark, TLC, TNT, and VH1. In addition, in 2012 the International Association of Chiefs of Police produced a 5 minute video on the Traffic Safety programs initiated by the SCSO.



INTERNAL AFFAIRS

The image of the Stafford County Sheriff's Office depends on the personal integrity and discipline of all the Sheriff's office employees. The Sheriff's Office encourages citizens to bring forward legitimate grievances regarding misconduct by employees. The Sheriff's Office investigates all complaints made by citizens. In addition, 50% of the complaints investigated by the Sheriff's Office are internally initiated by the Sheriff's Office. It is important to note that the Sheriff's Office is pro-active in investigating its own and ensuring the public that only the highest standard is acceptable.

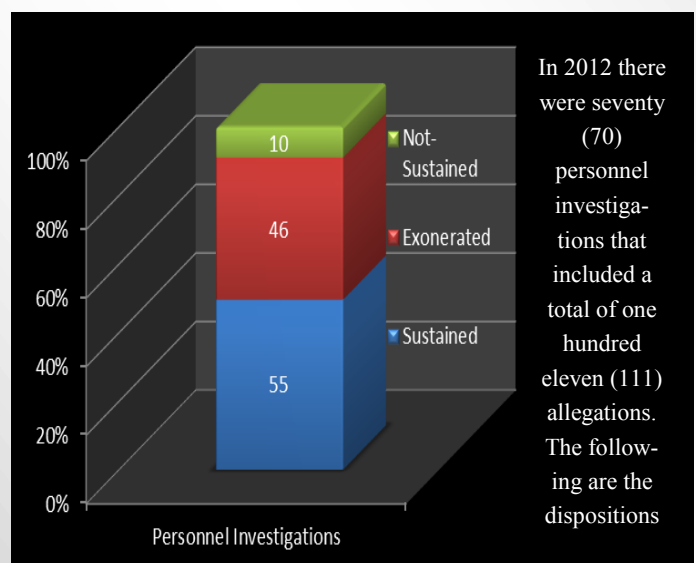
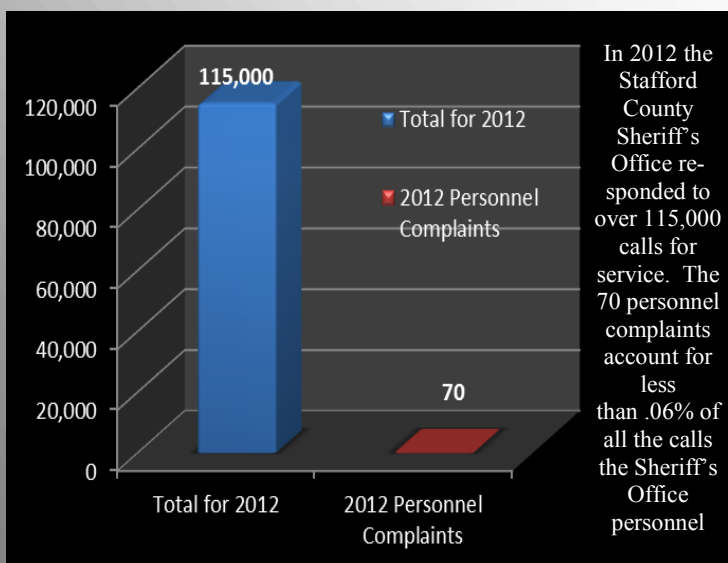
Upon completion of an investigation, the results shall be classified as the following:

A. **Unfounded:** The allegation is demonstrably false. There is no credible evidence to support the charge, or the employee charged was not involved, or the individual was not a member of the Stafford County Sheriff's Office.

B. **Exonerated:** The incident occurred, the employee's action were justified, lawful and within the Sheriff's authority and policy.

C. **Not sustained:** The incident occurred, but there is not sufficient evidence to prove the charges; thus the Sheriff's Office cannot proceed with the investigation or take any action against the employee.

D. **Sustained:** The allegations are supported by sufficient evidence to indicate that the employee committed one or more violations of policy and/or procedure, violations of law, or the investigation disclosed other violations.

Commendations:

A supervisor will assist you in completing a report to outline the incident and complaint regarding a deputy or civilian employee. You will be asked for information that identifies you and for information as to where you may be contacted.

You will be notified, by letter, that your complaint has been received and is under investigation by the Sheriff's Office. You may be contacted for further information.

In most cases, the investigation will take less than sixty days; however, should it take longer, you will be notified. When the investigation is complete, you will be notified of the disposition.
